

### SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS OPPOSE SEX HYGIENE

Special to The Capital. Fort Scott, Feb. 10 .- At the board of education conference of the Southeastern Kansas Teachers association, here last week, Superintendent Armstrong of the Pittsburg schools in an address before that body strongly condemned eugenics, sex hygiene, and compulsory medical inspection, as fads foisted upon the public schools. He declared the theorists who tried to experiment in this direction were doing so on the supposition that a strong physical race would result. In answer to this, he pointed to the American Indian as the strongest specimen of physical manhood, yet "poor Lo" knew nothing of eugenics, sex hygiene, etc. In closing, the professor declared that the theorists who were pushing "sex questions" in the schools should be "buried face downward."
