Reference is made to your letter in which you request the Revolutionary War record of David Hopkins, who received a pension in Fleming County, Kentucky.

The data furnished herein were obtained from the papers on file in pension claim, S.13307, based upon the service of David Hopkins, during the War of the Revolution.

David Hopkins was born January 1 or 21, 1761 in the state of Delaware, names of his parents not given.

He emlisted in Delaware in December, 1777, served twelve months as a private in Captain William Perry's company, was in several scouting parties around Delaware Bay and in several engagements with the British.

He moved to Pennsylvania in 1778, and enlisted in Washington County, Pennsylvania, in March, 1779, served twelve months as Indian Spy in Captain Wright's company, Colonel Valendingham's(?) regiment. He enlisted in March, 1780, served nine months as spy in Captain John Walls' company, was in several skirmishes with the Indians, He enlisted in March, 1781, served nine months as spy in Captain James Mun's(?) company, was in an engagement with the Indians at the mouth of Yellow Creek. He enlisted in March, 1782, served nine months as private in Captain Forbes' company, Colonel Williamson's regiment, doing guard duty on the frontiers.

He was allowed pension on his application exe-
