These public trusts he fulfilled with a sincere patriotism, a sagacious judgment and moderation and integrity which deserved and secured respect in private life, which for many years he faithfully served, he was social, intelligent, generous and wise.

The memory of his labors here was obliterated and his name and that of his was forgotten with resignation and peace without a pang.

Mr. Shuck has in his possession a silver medal of the B. K. Society, on the back of which are the letters B. K., December 5, 1778. The obverse has the Greek letters Β Κ, above stars and an index head. This medal was probably that of his ancestor, Peyton Shuck.

Shuck—Frederick Shuck born Alexandria, Virginia, 1788, died February 20, 1812, married Elizabeth Hogan, born Alexandria, Virginia, March 12, 1792, died October 24, 1888. Issue: John Thomas Shuck, born Washington, D. C., September 4, 1814, died at Leavenworth, Kansas, April 28, 1904; John Lewis Shuck born Alexandria, Virginia, in 1815, died at Barwell, South Carolina, August, 1861, married Harriette Hill, daughter of Addison Hill, and went to China as missionary. Mrs. Shuck was the first white woman missionary to that country. She died at Hong Kong in 1864. Mrs. Shuck published a book of her experiences. Of Frederick Shuck there is no record. Dr. John Thomas Shuck was married in 1840 to Eliza Barbara Madison Hill, who was born at Lynchburg, Virginia, January 30, 1812, daughter of William Davis Hill of Amherst County, Virginia, and Nancy Williams, whose parents were William Williams and Barbara Steele. She claimed relationship to Frederick Madison and Pochonias. Dr. John Thomas Shuck and his
